## **Nurse's Corner**

## Living Water, Summer Fun

Water is life and our lives are surrounded by it. It nourishes us, cools us, calms us or maybe frightens us. Water can be powerful and it is important to heed flood warnings. Our arroyos, ditches, rivers or irrigation canals can become torrential during a rainstorm in the mountains that doesn't even wet the city streets. The saying, "Turn around, don't drown" exists to protect you.

Summertime brings us to the pools and beaches. It's a great way cool off and relax. There are also a lot of tips to help keep us safe. Never swim alone. Make sure children are always watched. Use life vests in a boat, and drinking and operating a boat is never wise. (At least we don't have to worry about sharks in New Mexico!) But if you're around fresh water do be careful not to ingest it. Rinsing off after a swim is a good idea as well.

Speaking of drinking water, most people have been encouraged to increase their intake. How much is enough? You will find a multitude of answers if you look it up. Anywhere from 4-8 cups a day (32-64 ounces per day). Almost any liquid counts, but plain water is probably the best for hydration. It can depend on your age, size or medical conditions. It also depends on your activity level, more activity or heat leads to more sweating and should make you thirsty. But try to monitor how you're feeling too. Light headed or dizzy? Drink water. Headaches are sometimes caused by dehydration. If your child's urine is dark or they don't "need to go", make sure they get some extra liquids. (There can be other medical conditions that cause this, so don't let it go ignored for adult or child.)

Have fun, enjoy the summer and don't forget your sunscreen too!

## The Happy Hoper

### Claudia Russo

Claudia is a native Albuquerquean. They are hard to find nowadays. She was born at the old St. Joseph's Hospital downtown. She was the oldest of four children – Martha lives in Santa Fe, Alice in Portland, OR, Sherwood died in 2008. Martha is a "recovering" CPA and has written several books. Alice is an architect and designer. This family does not lack for accomplishments, as you will see.

Claudia's parents were Alice and S.Y. (Sherwood Young) Jackson Jr. S.Y. was actually the sixth S.Y. and brother Sherwood was the seventh. They were referred to as Jr (her father) and Sherwood. While her grandfather was still alive, he was S.Y. Jackson Sr. (They only counted those who were living. A little confusing, I agree. Guess you had to be there.)



Claudia's grandfather came to Albuquerque from Monte Vista, CO. He was the son of a "Colporteur" a term for a Baptist minister who traveled throughout the southwest, preached, gave out library books and Bibles. Her grandfather would travel with his father in a covered wagon visiting small communities in Texas, New Mexico and Colorado. They

would be gone for months at a time leaving wife and family.

S.Y. Jackson Sr., Claudia's grandfather, was very dedicated to Albuquerque. He did everything he could to develop the city and make it better. This was around 1918. S.Y. Sr. started many community organizations that still exist. He was a huge proponent of education, serving 26 years as the President of the APS (Albuquerque Public School) School Board. He and other interested people created TVI, which is now CNM. He was also highly involved with UNM and started the Lobo Club. (Unfortunately, you can't ask Claudia for tickets to athletic events.)

S.Y. Sr. was hired by four men to run Excelsior Laundry, a large commercial and residential concern. He did that until 1972 when it was sold to American Linen. Claudia's father worked at Excelsior as a young man, eventually becoming the manager. After it was sold, he had positions at Bank of New Mexico and retired as the head of the UNM Foundation.

Claudia's mother, Alice, joined her father in all of his community efforts, worked at Dan's Boots & Saddles in the North Valley and raised four children. Alice's family came from Cartagena, Colombia. Although Claudia has never traveled there, many family members still live there.

Claudia went to UNM receiving a B.S. in Biology in 1972. She never really applied her degree until she went back to school receiving her B.S in Nursing in 1989. She worked at UNMH in

pediatrics. Claudia has always considered herself a nurse/care giver.

In 1972, right after college, she married Tom Hensch. He was originally from Minneapolis, MN and so they returned to live there. The marriage didn't work out. However, she is grateful to Tom for introducing her to the Lutheran church.

After her divorce she met the love of her life, John Russo in Minneapolis. John was divorced with three children. They married in 1980 in the UNM chapel but continued to live in Minneapolis. For a long time John was president of a specialty advertising company until it was sold. (Specialty advertising is promotional items. For example, if you are a business owner you might have give-away items like pens, folders, cup holders with your company name imprinted.) John fell in love with New Mexico the first time he saw it. (He was bitten by the Enchantment bug.) During the 1980's, they lived in Albuquerque. That is when Claudia went back to school for her nursing degree.

They lived in many places. John became a consultant and spent years working with various specialty advertising companies, revamping and improving their operations to prepare them for sale. They lived in Chicago, Connecticut, and Indiana before moving back to Albuquerque in 2005 to help out with Claudia's parents. By this time they had started their own specialty advertising distributorship business, which Claudia ran. They had websites. It was nice to be able to run the business from anywhere.

John was an avid stamp collector or more correctly a philatelist. He was particularly interested in "covers" or envelopes. His specialty was stampless covers - letters sent before the advent of stamps. Often the covers were just a folded piece of paper with the address on the outside and writing on the inside, sealed with wax. Claudia learned a great deal about stamps and covers. Through this she learned some interesting history and acquired an eye for the beauty of the hobby. John passed away in 2020.

Claudia's stepdaughter, Anne, lives in Milwaukee, WI and works in upper management for Kohl's. Her stepson, Steven, lives in Minneapolis, MN and works for a company that creates and supplies educational test materials and textbooks. As a result of her relationship with Anne and Steve, she is a grandmother to four. Her children and grandchildren are a special blessing. In addition, Claudia has a Scottish terrier, Wallace. She has had several of them. Wallace gives her good company.

Claudia is organizing the new "Care Outreach" team at Cross of Hope. The purpose of the latter is to provide transportation and meals to those in need during an emergency. Talk to Claudia to learn more. If you have a need for either of these services, contact Claudia or the church office.
