A Season for Everything: Sabbatical

For six years you shall sow your land and gather in its yield; but the seventh year you shall let it rest and lie fallow. Exodus 23: 10-11a



The Sabbatical has its roots in the agricultural context of the biblical world. Rest as part of the care for the land that produces is an important season of the cycle of life. In the Hebrew Law code it was tied to the forgiveness of debts. A healthy 'reset' may be a helpful way to understand the sabbatical period. Your Rocky Mountain Synod encourages its congregations to use a sabbatical period to care for the healthy partnership between their rostered ministers (pastors and deacons) and people. A sabbatical offers opportunity to get off the treadmill and provides an opportunity for renewal of vision and hope. It's more than just a chance to recharge your batteries for another year. It can be a life and soulchanging time, a time when perspective and the Holy Spirit can come together.

Cross of Hope has offered me an 8 week sabbatical period after each 7 years of ministry as part of my call as your pastor. With encouragement and consultation with Church Council, we will be in a sabbatical period from June 3 until July 29 of this year. The guiding title for my sabbatical is:

Into the Silence: an extrovert's journey into contemplation

After a period of rest and renewal with my family exploring some National Parks, I will engage in a time of learning and growing through studying, experiencing, and exploring the role of contemplation on the journey. Through the wisdom of Father Richard Rohr and the Center for Action and Contemplation. This time of sabbatical will offer the space and time to read, practice and experience new patterns of prayer and being with God through silence and stillness that can offer personal growth that will benefit those in relationship with me as well.

Silent Compassion: Finding God in Contemplation will introduce me to this gift. Everything Belongs: the Gift of Contemplative Prayer will continue the journey while the Naked Now and Falling Upward with the journal companion. This journal will help me process this time in silent retreat which will be the center of the sabbatical experience. The Monastery of Christ in the Desert will be my place of retreat. It is a Benedictine monastery near Abiquiu, NM. I'm excited to experience God in a way that both challenges my innate extroversion and is what my spirit longs to know; what is the role of silent contemplation to the spiritual journey that is our life of faith?



I would spray green paint on the wall in the picture of a leprechaun. I would write, "I was here."


5th grade - Sophie

Robert was born in Cortez, Colorado but the family lived on a ranch in Mancos, Colorado. His father, Karl, and grandfather emigrated to the U.S. in 1896 from Germany. Karl was six years old at the time. Robert believes his grandfather did not like the approach Germany was taking at the time to military enlistment. He had a tattoo on his arm regarding his military status (I could find no history regarding this practice). While I couldn't find anything about this the country's conscription for military service was two years active duty and then five years reserve. At the time the country differed in laws from towns and territories. It took many years to unify the political and legal systems and it remained very patriarchal. In the meantime, in the 1890's, the country was growing into industrial dominance. The three surrounding countries, England, France and Russia formed an alliance against what they saw as a threat from Germany. Many of these factors led up to World War I. There could have been multiple reasons that Robert's grandfather decided to immigrate to the United States.

Robert's grandfather originally went to Utah thinking he could find work there as a tailor, which was his profession. Later he decided to try farming and moved to Colorado. Robert said there was a coal mine adjacent to their land. So, his grandfather and father mined and farmed. Mainly they had cattle and alfalfa. They were pretty self-sufficient – they took grain to the granary to be milled into flour, fruit and vegetables from the garden were canned, there were cows for milk, chickens for eggs and meat, along with cattle for meat. The only things they had to go to town for were sugar and coffee. As Robert said, "We lived on a ranch." The family lived in town most of the year so the children could go to school. During the summer they were on the ranch.

Robert had a sister, Ruth, ten years older and another sister, Shirley, four years younger than him. In 1947, when Robert was in eighth grade, the family moved to Albuquerque because his mother was having health problems. She died at the age of 58. Ruth lived in Albuquerque as an adult and when Shirley married, she moved to Farmington. Robert's father lived to the age of 99. He was a jack-of-all-trades, including blacksmithing, carpentry and plumbing. He worked until he was 72. He worked at the sign company which Robert eventually worked for too. After Robert's mother died his father met another lady, married and returned to Colorado. When she died, Robert's dad moved back to Albuquerque, living between Robert and his sister's houses.

Robert was in the Navy during the Korean War. He went through basic training at Great Lakes, Illinois. Next stop was San Diego for diesel engine training. He was shipped off to South Korea. He was on a small ship with a crew of 95. The South Korean's PT (Patrol Torpedo) boats would break down frequently. Robert and his crew mates were sent to pick up the broken-down boats and fix them. He did not see battle.

When Robert returned home, he had enough of the smell of diesel engine fuel and decided his career was not in that field. He re-met Ann, a friend of his sister, Shirley. One thing led to another. Robert and Ann were married for 55 years before she died in 2006. Robert worked for Donrey Outdoor Advertising for 45 years. He was the Operations Manager for 25 years. Robert retired when the company was bought and became Clear Channel Outdoor Signs.

Robert moved into his house in 1958. His mortgage was \$95. Wouldn't that be nice to have today! Before buying his current house in the North Valley, he lived on the West Mesa for a while. Can you picture that – there wasn't much on the West Mesa then. His daughter lives on the West Mesa now. That is how Robert got introduced to Cross of Hope. He was not a chartered member but arrived shortly thereafter.

Robert's daughter, Sheryl, has a son, Brandon. Brandon has a daughter who is four years old. Robert does make toys for her. His designs are pretty intricate. For example, I saw a train he made and all the pieces fit together like a puzzle. Besides his human family, Robert feeds and is friends with several feral cats. They know good food comes from Robert's house. They are fortunate kitties since they can go to Robert's house or various neighbors. This gives variety in their menu. His closest animal friend is Rosie, his elderly Chihuahua.

Cross of Hope Hosting Family Promise March 5-12, 2023

Family Promise Mission:

To empower families in our community who are at risk of homelessness or experiencing homelessness to achieve sustainable independence through a community based response.

Family Promise Vision:

Locally: The ultimate vision is to have sufficient support congregations, volunteers, and paid staff to prevent a waiting list of families that qualify for Family Promise of Albuquerque (FPA) services.

Nationwide: Family Promise will have a home, a livelihood, and the chance to build a better future. (The current success rate here is over 91 percent.)

Cross of Hope has generously supported Family Promise of Albuquerque as a meaningful Outreach Ministry for 8 years! We are one of 22 churches who volunteer as a support congregation. Beginning Sunday, March 5 and through Saturday, March 12, we will need volunteers to have hot meals delivered to the Montgomery Church of Christ Parish house by 5p each evening.

In-person hosts are needed from 5 to 8p. It works nicely if the host/s want to bring dinner, but for folks who work that is difficult and often others bring dinner. There are usually home care items like toilet paper, paper towels, laundry soap, and weekend grocery items requested by Family Promise staff. We will have a list of those items on sign-up dates.

Our coordinators, Lois Caipen and Jan Anderson organize with the FPA staff and COH members to supply the current needs for our week of hosting. Please call if you have any questions. "Love is patient, love is kind..." 1Corinthians 13

This is one of my very favorite Bible verses. I think we have all heard it at weddings and other church functions. As I was thinking about this verse, I couldn't help but think of something that happened in my classroom many years ago.

It was a Speech class and the assignment was to give a persuasive speech. I always found in high school speech classes that students got very creative and quite often they would incorporate their own lives into their speech. That was the case with this one.

The student's name was Joe and he started his speech like this..."Good night Joe. See you in the morning. Those were the last words my mother ever spoke to me." Joe continued by telling us that at the time he was eleven years old and his brother was 16. His mother and father were going out for dinner with neighbors and the boys stayed home to play games or watch TV. Joe was asleep by the time his parents returned.

Some time during the night Joe's mother died of a brain aneurysm. Joe went on to tell us about his family, especially his mother. He finished his speech by saying, "I know this is a persuasive speech and you all are wondering what I'm trying to persuade you to do. Well, I told my mother I loved her all the time." Then he paused and asked the class, "Have you told your mother you love her today?" Needless to say, there wasn't a dry eye in the room. Joe gave many speeches over the semester, but that one always sticks out in my memory. Have you told those you love and care about that you love them? We never know what tomorrow brings.
