

COH Hosting Coming Soon August 14 – 21, 2022

Currently there are three families with a total of seven: Three adults and four children*: ages 7 months - 10yrs. (*There is a family with three older children 9 - 14 years old who may visit. The FP staff will give us plenty of notice as needed.)

The Hosting LOCATION is the parsonage of Montgomery Church of Christ (MCOC) which is a two story house between the International School and the new Church building. This was added at our March 2022: 5-7pm HOSTINGS in PERSON (ALL week except Wednesday), MCOC 7201 Montgomery Blvd NE 87109, (just east of Louisiana Blvd) Family Promise contact number: 505 363 1144, you may call for clarity of location.

We thank you for your gracious and generous support of the Families who would otherwise be homeless. Instead, they are supported and are working toward sustainable independence. Two of the three families have vouchers in hand and one has an inspection scheduled this week. The third family may be admitted to the Saranam Program in early August. There are no concerns about our need to provide food and meals and Hosting 5-7pm. There are families ready to enter the program!!

How you can help:

- Write our dates of Hosting on your calendars and PRAY for the families.
- **Sign-Up To Donate Food and Household Items:** items: from the list of items at FP sign-up tables on Sundays: 7/31 and on the 7th of August between services or call Jan or Lois.
- **Provide Hot Meals:** needed Sunday 8/14 through Saturday 8/20 at 5:00p. (Delivery help will be available.)
- Pray about your volunteer possibilities.
- **Sign-Up to Host In-Person:** 5p-7p, Sunday 8/14 Saturday 8/20, except Wednesday). Sign the Safe Haven Policy if you have never signed it or hosted before. (Please, join the families for the hot meal provided.) MASKS are expected to be worn by all present unless they are eating or drinking.

Lois and Jan are so very grateful for your generous gifts of time, money, food, household items, and of course your prayers. Together, WE MAKE a DIFFERENCE in the lives of all of the children served because their families are able to survive the stress of near homelessness.

Unlocking Love

'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets." Matthew 22:37-40

The season after Pentecost is the longest season in the liturgical year. During this time, we celebrate our role as the church in the ongoing life of Christ in the world, guided by the companionship and inspiration of the Holy Spirit. We encounter scripture that invites us to give faithful attention to our formation, devotion, ministry, and mission on a daily basis as the life of Christ is lived through us. (sacredordinarydays.com/Pentecost)

This summer our Making Faith Connections small groups are invited to consider unlocking love through the scriptures of worship and the 10 commandments. As we contemplate how Christ lives through our lives by the power of the Holy Spirit, we'll also consider how the 10 commandments provide clear boundaries that unlock our ability to freely love God and neighbor. The questions for reflection will remain the same as your small group, your family, or yourself in devotion encounter new scripture and commandment each week. The 10 commandments are taken from Exodus 20:1-17 and we'll use the tool for teaching the faith in the home from Martin Luther called the Small Catechism (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, pg. 1160) to aid our reflection (Find many options to purchase from Augsburg Fortress by clicking <u>here</u>, get it for your phone or device in the app store, or speak to Pr. Adam if you need a copy).

God bless you as we continue to share the journey of life and faith.

August 7 – 8^{th} commandment – You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor. August 14 – 9^{th} commandment – You shall not covet your neighbor's house. August 21 – 10^{th} commandment -You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or male or female slave, or ox, or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbor.

Women on Wednesday (WOW) 2022-2023



This session will focus on good women, good women in the Bible and good women in our lives. Think about what you think makes someone "good" and what our society says about that. We'll start each meeting with me talking about a good Biblical woman and then the second part will be you talking about a good woman in your own life. It can be someone you know or knew in real life, a character in a book, a historical or public figure you admire. Tell us a little about their life and

then tell us what makes them good in your eyes and how you use their lessons today. You are free to use any approach you wish (if you have pictures you want displayed send them to me and I'll get them up on the screen). You do not have to use any technology, you can just tell us with no aids.

The last meeting of every month will also include a celebration of the birthdays of WOW members for the month. Every meeting there will be a basket (the Least Coin offering) for contributions to appropriate funds. I will need volunteers to offer the opening prayer for each session and Sherrie (2) will offer our prayers for those in need and also celebrate the good things that happen to us. Please contact me directly if you want to volunteer for opening prayers and if you want to talk about a good woman (or 2) in your life. Just let me know which you are volunteering for and if there are dates you prefer or dates you cannot attend. I'll put together a tentative schedule of who is doing what when and we can work from there. I will handle the first session so you can see what not to do.

Ruth Hinkel

Birthplace: Görlitz, Germany

Hobbies: Gardening, crocheting, Swedish weaving, reading, classical music

Most of us know Ruth. You may have been welcomed to church on Sunday by her. Or you may have admired our beautiful gardens – Ruth's handiwork. On Sunday, July 10⁻ Ruth decided it was time to "pass the shovel" of leadership on to another group of gardener lovers. Fortunately, Ruth will continue to be a Cross of Hope Gardener. She has been one of our gardeners since she took things over from Barb Ostby in 2004. We owe Ruth a huge thank you for all her work. Take a moment to give her a well-deserved "thank you."

Ruth was the oldest of six children. She has one brother, Fred, and four sisters (the youngest is 19 years younger). All of them live in the Salt Lake City area. In the spring of 1952, when Ruth was almost 20 years old and Fred was 18, they immigrated to the U.S. Her parents and sisters had to stay behind until her father could get a visa. It was a bit challenging since his hometown was now in Poland, not Germany. In spite of that, with the help of the LDS (Mormon) church and Ruth and Fred, they were able to sponsor them. The rest of the family arrived in the U.S. in the fall of 1953. Sponsorship is always necessary showing that the immigrant would have a place to live and financial support. Ruth's father was a tool and die maker, so it was not hard for him to find work. Her mother went to work as a seamstress after the youngest was in school. Ruth and Fred found a larger apartment to accommodate the entire family.

Fred joined the U.S. Army. Ruth worked for a casket company from 1952 to 1966. (We can only imagine what little extra she slipped beneath the liner.) After five years, Ruth became a U.S. citizen. Heinz, her husband to be, came to the U.S. in 1951. He also became a U.S. citizen when his five years passed. Since Heinz was ten years older than Ruth, he had many more life experiences. He held a position within the LDS church. Additionally, he had been in the German Army. He was a prisoner of war (POW) in Russia. While there he became ill and couldn't work, so he was released in a prisoner exchange. Once in the U.S., he went to the University of Utah majoring in Banking and Finance. Because he was German it was difficult to impossible for him to find a job in this field.

Both Ruth and Heinz became disenchanted with the LDS church and its teachings. They simultaneously decided to become Lutherans. A request came through their new church looking for teachers on the Navajo reservation. Timing was great. Ruth had been thinking about the Peace Corps. She went and listened to a presentation about the reservation job. When she got home she told Heinz all about it. He was on board. He could teach math. In 1966 they were off to the reservation in Rock Point, AZ. Under Heinz's guidance Ruth could teach grades 1 - 4 and Heinz grades 5 - 8. Their plan was to stay for ten years. However, Heinz had some health problems. After five years (1971) they moved to Albuquerque to be closer to medical care.

Ruth got a job as a seamstress with Pioneer Wear and worked there until 1992. They made Western outer wear. After a few years as a seamstress, she supervised the leather finishing and the last couple of years she was in the fabric finishing line. In between these assignments she worked in the production office keeping records and schedules. Heinz got a job in accounting. Enough time had passed that people weren't concerned that he was German and his past.

The transition from Mormon to Lutheran was difficult within the family. Both Ruth and Heinz's parents had been Lutheran and Catholic. Both religions were predominant in Germany – depending on what part of the country you came from. Heinz was an only child, so it was not quite as a bad for him. However, with very close-knit families and the teachings of the LDS church, it was difficult to accept what Ruth and Heinz had done. Eventually, all was resolved, and the family has remained close. Ruth has a nephew who lives in Edgewood and recently became a Bishop in the LDS church.

While living on the reservation, they would get a four-week break. They used this time to travel to different places in the U.S., car camping along the way.

Ruth has been very involved in our church over the years. Besides being an active gardener, she has served on the church council, been a part of W³, helps in the kitchen during various events, is a liturgical reader, a part of WOW and the choir. She particularly enjoyed doing "OcHoperfest" with Pastor Dale.

Ruth has been an asset to our church and a cherished friend to many. If you don't know her, take this opportunity to meet her. She will celebrate her 90th birthday this year. Send her a birthday card or an email. She will be in Utah celebrating her special day, so you won't see her then. Thanks, Ruth, for being you and for all you do.

What happened at the August Meeting?

At the beginning of our meetings, Pastor Adam offers an opening prayer. However, he was at Rainbow Trail Confirmation Camp but that didn't stop his desire to be with us. Items and topics from a prepared agenda are addressed. Each agenda item is discussed. Action items are approved by voice vote.

Meetings end with a prayer by Pastor Adam.
