A Voice Calling - A Lent Devotion



Listen. There is a voice calling from the desert inviting us to enter a sacred space. A space where through fasting, prayer, reading Scripture, and meditation we quiet the worldly voices that shout and intentionally focus on seeking to hear God's still small voice. By trying something new, even challenging, this Lent, our relationship with God can be enriched and deepened. I desire to know God more deeply, to grow in His grace, and to reflect Him more richly. Join me as we step into the uncomfortable and maybe even the unknown because I am confident we will find God along this path.

Each week will include a reading focused on the Stations of the Cross. The first day of the week will have the text of the reading for reference throughout the week. In addition, each week will include a piece of classical art centered on the Station of the Cross to provide visual encouragement for our meditations and reflections. Each day we are encouraged to focus on and practice one of the ancient spiritual disciplines. Each day will also include reflections, quotations, or stories of witnesses, including martyrs to draw our hearts toward God.

Council Corner

At the close of last year and the start of this year technology was at the forefront of activity. Like any other business, the use of computers has become paramount to the success of our organization. As such, staying current with computer upgrades is a requirement. During the budget process last year, the council approved the purchase of new computers on a rolling basis replacing several every year. In December the first of the computers budgeted for this year were purchased and installed.

December also saw the installation of a new remote controlled camera system to enhance the organization's streaming capabilities. Two new pan/tilt/ zoom cameras, a camera controller, switcher/encoder and a new computer were installed replacing the use of a single cell phone to stream worship, memorial and other service activities held in the sanctuary. The system is able to stream feeds from the two cameras and the PowerPoint presentation computer, and has the capacity to add additional cameras should that be desired in the future. The new system is also connected to the large TV monitors in the great hall allowing for view of the activities there.

Early January saw the purchase and installation of new wireless microphones to replace aging equipment, enhance the sound system capacity and increase the range of the microphones. Two new wireless body pack microphones replaced the one used by Pastor Adam and added a new matching one that can be used for a second pastor or assisting minister. The three aging handheld baton microphones were replaced with four new ones with enhanced sound quality. Initial use of the six new wireless microphones has demonstrated significant enhancement in the ability to not only control sound quality but allow for easier use by those using the microphones.

These new technology enhancements, while still requiring some tweaking to fully incorporate the capacities into our community's life, will bring new and exciting capabilities to Cross of Hope as we strive to meet our mission of sharing Christ's love through worship, education and outreach.


Lenten Series: Why Church?

The Happy Hope-r Linda Willoughby The Woman Behind the Scenes

Linda was the third of four children born to Garland Watson Brittain and Frances Jane Brittain. While Linda was born in Coalinga, Ca, at the age of three the family moved to Imperial Valley, CA. Her dad, Garland, had a heat stroke before Linda was born which affected his memory. Nevertheless, he was always employed, working 1½ jobs to provide for the family. He was a jack of all trades. He took care of various facilities and the gardens for the school district. Linda's mother, Frances, was an elementary school teacher teaching English as a Second Language (ESL). Most of her students were pre-kindergarten age. Frances was physically limited due to bone disease which resulted in numerous hip surgeries. She couldn't do recess duty which was a requirement. Consequently, she could not continue teaching within the school system. So, she tutored children of all ages, ethnicities, and abilities. When Linda was in high school, she recalls her mother working with physically disabled adults including blind, deaf and brain injured, etc. Wow what resourceful and great role models both her parents were.

When Linda was about seven years old, she discovered an old violin in a bottom drawer. Linda asked her parents if she could learn to play this instrument. Her grandmother paid for her violin lessons which were given at Lou Lang's Music Store taught by Lou's wife, Ethel. Ethel noticed immediately that Linda had a good ear and would be a good teacher. So, she taught her to teach. Can you imagine this gift Linda received creating the foundation for her lifelong career.

Linda's older sister, Marguerite, and older brother, Tom, were both musically inclined. Marguerite played the clarinet and Tom the trumpet. Linda would play ensemble hymns with them frequently in church. Her younger brother, Douglas, was not so inclined.

Linda played with Ethel in the symphony when she was in seventh grade. Ethel would take Linda, and several other musicians, to rehearsal in Yuma, AZ which was 86 miles away. Rehearsals went from 7 to 10pm. Linda didn't get home until about 1 am.

The local school system did not offer anything for string instruments. In middle school, Linda played the bass clarinet. Later in college she played the contra bass clarinet. She would play the violin for special events such as musical productions at the school, weddings and funerals.

In 1975 Linda went to Point Loma College (affiliated with the Nazarene Church) in San Diego for two years. The generosity of a local doctor and his wife helped pay for her tuition. After two years, the doctor's family adopted a baby and could no longer afford to help with tuition. College is where Linda met Jeff Willoughby. They fell "madly in love." Jeff could only afford Point Loma College for a year. While Linda continued in school Jeff went home to Santa Clara (in northern California). Now they had a long-distance relationship until they married in 1978. They settled in Santa Clara since Jeff already had a good job with Epitaxy. Epitaxy made silicon wafers for computers. Jeff had been promoted to a supervisor position. That was quite a feat for someone so young! Linda got a job at Ramtek which made mainframe computers. She worked in the maintenance contract area.

Jeff was interested in becoming a California Highway Patrol Officer. After passing all the physical and mental entrance exams he was accepted in the training program. After two weeks of boot camp and an actual evening shift ride along he recognized this wasn't the job for him. He then interviewed and got hired to be a shift supervisor by Sumitomo Stix, a water processing company, which was a division of Mitsubishi and was later called Sumco.

Linda and Jeff bought a house in San Jose in 1981. Linda was still working for Ramtek Corporation in Publications which involved publishing software and hardware handbooks for machine operations and involved 4-6 color printing for the marketing of various types of equipment. She attended Mission Junior College and completed an Associates of Arts (A.A.) in Administration. She continued to play her violin and taught private music lessons and played with the Ohlone Chamber Orchestra from Freemont CA.

When PCs came on the market Ramtek closed. Linda went to full-time teaching affiliating with "The Music Place for Children." She taught group violin, group guitar and individual piano plus having private students.

In 1994 Jeff's company transferred him to New Mexico to establish a start-up facility. In January 1995, Linda moved here to join Jeff. For the first two months they were waiting for their house to be finished being built in Rio Rancho. In the meantime, they lived in the Del Rio apartments just southeast of Cross of Hope on Coors and Montano. Linda would go out for a walk every day and always admired the gardens at Cross of Hope. She was looking for a job that would allow her time to have private music students. There was an ad in the paper for a position at Cross of Hope. She called Cross of Hope and spoke with Pastor Dale (Bauer) and applied for the position. Pr. Dale was quite excited with this applicant. Linda was interviewed by 12 Council members. (That was scary.) Linda told the Council, "Your church could really use me." She has no idea where that came from. Obviously, it worked. That was April 1995. The rest is history.

At that time the pre-school met in the great hall. A campaign was started to raise money for the portable which the pre-school now occupies. In 1985 the sanctuary was originally the area between the poles in the great hall. Phase 2 (1988) added the sanctuary and office strip. In 2004, Phase 3 built the school wings, and the portable was moved to the current location.

Over the last 29 years you can only imagine how many people Linda has met. When asked what her favorite memories are, Linda said going out to lunch with the staff and volunteers annually. She likes to interface with everyone. Regarding the actual job, it is best when everything runs smoothly. We can all identify with that. This job has always allowed her to grow. "It always morphs."

He remembered a male teacher he had later at mechanics school who was just a cool guy.

I'm sure all of you could add to that list. The teacher I admired was my high school Spanish teacher. She was the main reason I became a Spanish teacher.

Who else do you admire? What about the Pastors we have had here at Cross of Hope? We joined COH in 2008 and have been so impressed with all of our Pastors, Pastor Adam, Pastor Dale, Pastor Russ, Pastor Matt, Pastor Rick, and Pastor Pat. We have been truly blessed here at Cross of Hope. Take a few minutes to tell one or all of them how much you admire them and thank them for all they do.

Linda plays in a community orchestra called Albuquerque Symphony Orchestra of New Mexico. She gives private lessons on the violin and guitar. If you want to hear some great music, come to a performance of the Symphony. They usually perform twice a quarter. Linda attends and is a member of the Rio Vista Nazarene Church on Golf Course Road.

Linda had a dog (Border Collie named Annie May) who died a while ago. Now she has Pastor Adam's dog, Chai, to interface with a bit when Chai is at the office. Can't forget Linda's wild rabbits who come up on her patio for apples and carrots every morning. The neighbor's dog got jealous once and jumped the fence to chase the rabbits. However, the dog couldn't manage to get back over the fence and was scared when Linda "busted" him. He has never returned!

Jeff, Linda's husband, passed away rather suddenly one year ago, December of 2022. Jeff was a huge support to Linda with her music endeavors. He always told people that Linda was in the ministry by working at Cross of Hope. Jeff supported Linda by going to her concerts. He made sure that their current home, when it was being built, had a music room to teach lessons with a separate entrance. They enjoyed their home, having pets, taking walks, and watching movies some evenings.

Linda continues to be the "hub" for Cross of Hope. If you don't know Linda, know she is working hard on our behalf and keeps everything running smoothly. You can only meet her if you volunteer or drop in during the week. She definitely will make your day!

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

Life Together-Dietrich Bonhoeffer

In Life Together, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, renowned Christian minister, professor, and author of The Cost of Discipleship recounts his unique fellowship in an underground seminary during the Nazi years in Germany. Giving practical advice on how life together in Christ can be sustained in families and groups, Life Together is bread for all who are hungry for the real life of Christian fellowship.

Every Good Endeaver: Connecting your work to God's work - Timothy Keller

Keller shows readers that biblical wisdom is immensely relevant to our questions about work today. In fact, the Christian view of work—that we work to serve others, not ourselves—can provide the foundation of a thriving professional and balanced personal life. Keller shows how excellence, integrity, discipline, creativity, and passion in the workplace can help others and even be considered acts of worship—not just of self-interest.

A Woman of Words - Angela Hunt (Book 3)

Disciple Matthew, a former tax collector, is invited to work with Peter, James, and John in Jerusalem.
