Cross of Hope Preschool



At the end of November, Cross of Hope's amazing preschool was accredited through ACSI (Association of Christian Schools International) for the next six years. Cross of Hope has been given the distinction of accreditation since 2009. Accreditation is a big deal. It holds the preschool accountable and ensures that the children in our care are getting a quality Christian education. Because of this, the preschool has been able to receive more grant money, get national recognition, and receive top notch professional development for all the teachers on the preschool staff. Each year during that time frame, the preschool will have to participate in a yearly review and go over the standards that are outlined and submit whether it meets them or not and what the staff has done to better the preschool.

How did we get this accreditation? Every five years, ACSI does what's called a site visit. There is a team that is designated to go through the

preschool program and determine if the preschool meets the very high standards expected from ACSI. When the accreditation team comes in, they go through all of the preschool's files and records, observe in the classrooms, ensure the teachers are qualified, and look for Christianity throughout the preschool program. This is very intensive, and a lot of work, before, during and after. ACSI expects excellence, and the preschool must meet those standards in order to have the National recognition of being accredited though the organization.

We have a very special preschool. The amount of parent involvement, communication, the obvious Christian values instilled in our staff and program, and dedication from the educators to our preschool has led us to this continued great honor of accreditation. Each day I walk into the preschool, and can feel the love, dedication and faith each and every teacher has. Their devotion is poured out into the children. I see the children having fun learning new things and growing in their journey of faith. I see their families wanting to be involved with the preschool, making time to volunteer in the classrooms, and tap into their generous spirit. I see happy teachers, who truly want to be there, and care about each child in their classroom. And most of all I see the love of Christ through each end every person who walks in the preschool doors.

Las Posadas



There is evidence that Las Posadas originated in colonial Mexico as a way for Spaniards to share Christmas traditions with native people. It is a religious festival celebrated in Mexico and some parts of the United States between December 16 and 24. The tradition, taking place in what we would call the winter solstice, was and is celebrated as a festival including a dramatization of when Joseph and Mary were only able to seek shelter in a stable. It was a mere stable where the Christ Child was born.

Cross of Hope will host Las Posadas on December 18 beginning at 6pm. There will be a reinactment, food (enchiladas, posole, beans, biscochitos, and hot chocolate), mariachis, and a piñata. Advent - The Space Between

The Space Between is not intended to be descriptive of the season at the beginning of the church year typically assigned to the 4 weeks leading up to Christmas conveniently occupying the space between Thanksgiving and Christmas. It is most Profound. Advent is a season of the church year that invites us to step into, or at least gaze deeply at, the present time as the space between the promise of God's eternal reign set forth in Christ and the fulfillment of that promise at the end (or fullness) of time. You may have never noticed that the worship texts after All Saints Sunday often refer to the end of time. Even Sundays deep into the typical season of Advent only move to the beginning of the Christmas narrative the last Sunday or so before.

This year's theme carries us through the seven weeks between All Saints Sunday and the Eve of Christmas and invite us to reflect on the gift of the present moment as 'now and not yet' - the space between God's great revelation in Christ and the good news of 'Christ come again' in the fullness of time. We hope that this expanded season of Advent holds a blessing of space to wonder, marvel, and rejoice at the good news that Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again. Please join us as we reflect on our lives of faith in this space between.

Art's parents were Arthur and Martha (Lujan). He was the oldest of six children. He has three brothers (one deceased) and two sisters. All but one lives in Santa Fe. The other lives in Arizona. The picture from left to right: Shirley (the oldest sister), Sherry (the younger sister), Art, Martha (Art's mother), RC, Chris (RC's twin sister. She is 4 minutes older).

Arthur was a union painter doing commercial and industrial painting. He did this to fill in from his true occupation and love – a full-time cowboy. Martha married Arthur when she was 15 years old. Having six children was a lot for one so young. They divorced when Art was 15 years old.

The family lived in Las Vegas, NM. Arthur was a boxer when he was young, including when he was in the Army. He was stationed in Okinawa, Japan as a "radar operator." Radar operators played a crucial role in World War II. They watched for Japanese airplanes and warned of their approach.

Arthur tried out for the 1952 Olympics as a boxer representing his Army unit. Unfortunately, he did not make the cut. Art said his dad was not a big man, maybe 5'5" 130 pounds when wet, but he was <u>very</u> strong. Guess that would come from boxing and being a cowboy.

After the divorce, Art's dad moved to the South Valley (in Albuquerque). He had a "stud" horse he showed at different venues. He did trail rides along the ditch bank from Albuquerque to Santa Fe and from Albuquerque to Socorro. Additionally, he was part of the Sheriff's Posse. So of course, Art was also involved with the Junior Sheriff's Posse. Arthur passed away in March 2023.

Martha was a homemaker. The kids kept her busy. Art said that while they didn't have much, his mother always helped the neighbors bringing them food. Maybe that is where Art gets his generous and caring heart. Martha is living in Santa Fe.

After the divorce, Art moved to Albuquerque to live with his grandparents for a year. At the age of 16, he got his own apartment and a job at Presbyterian Hospital. Of course, there was school (Rio Grande High School). Art played football, basketball, wrestling and track. What a surprise!

While playing football at age 15, Art detached his retina but didn't know it. He was ready to continue playing. Martha made an appointment with an eye doctor who was ready to schedule surgery. Art said he had a game to play. The doctor told him that was fine but if he played, he may never see again. It was Art's choice. Art decided on the immediate surgery. It was time to switch sports to something a little less physically intense because the doctor wouldn't sign off for him to play. Now it was wrestling, track, shot put, javelin and basketball. The latter didn't last because Art was too physical. Hmm, can you imagine. With all this going on, his studies did not suffer. Art was a member of the National Honor Society. Art went to college at UNM but dropped out his freshman year. He returned to school 40 years later and earning a B.A. in Accounting from the Anderson School of Management in 2010.

After high school, Art continued working at Presbyterian Hospital until 1988, working his way up. Then he went to work for Bernalillo County for 25 years and retired. While working here he had the opportunity to attend conferences locally and out of state. He met a lot of different people, and they discussed legislative issues and helped develop new legislation.

RC described herself as an "Army brat." Her father, Edmund, was stationed mainly in El Paso, TX and Germany. There were five children in the family – two boys and three girls. Her parents divorced when RC was very young. Her mother was no longer a part of her life. Due to circumstances, RC's dad had to put the children into foster care for a time. He made sure they were all together and that when situations changed, he could get the children back in his custody. Her father did remarry while stationed in Germany. RC did not have a good relationship with her stepmother. She left home when she was 17 years old with nothing but the clothes on her back.

RC 's high school years were in El Paso. Texas was the one state she remembers living in longer than four years. While there she went to UTEP for a short period of time. She always wanted to be a nurse but had no funds for that schooling. Instead, she went to school to become a Medical Transcriptionist. Unfortunately, she couldn't get a job because she was not bi-lingual. Instead, she got a job as a teller in a local bank. There she became friendly with a banking customer who was a manager at a local insurance agency. She encouraged RC to come work for the agency as a claims rep. RC worked her way up in the agency over the next six years.

After five years with the insurance agency, RC wanted to take a vacation. Her little sister suggested she fly to Hawaii for a visit. RC always wanted to see other places. The two she was determined to see were Hawaii and Australia. With some foresight, she updated her resume before going to Hawaii for a one-week visit. The stars must have aligned in her favor. The day before her vacation ended, she applied for two jobs, landing one at an insurance agency. She moved all her belongings to Hawaii in May 1990 and stayed until August 1998. While there she got married, became a homeowner and had a child, Connor. RC's favorite pastimes were golfing, racket ball and boogie boarding. She laughs recalling the "leash" attached to the surf boards were not long enough for her (the scourge of being tall). After eight years it was time to come back to the mainland.

For three years she ran a pre-school in her home until Connor was old enough to start first grade. For the next five years she worked in a law firm that dealt with Native American issues. Sadly, one of the partners passed away which ended the partnership contract. RC was hired by Cardinal Health where she spent eight years until the company decided to outsource their work to the Philippines. RC received a good severance package which allowed her to consider college again.

At the same time her marriage was coming to an end. She knew she had to start over again and being able to go to school was a blessing. RC attended Brown-Mackey College (now defunct) full-time. She achieved her A.S. in Business Administration in 2016 with a 4.0 GPA.

RC's son, Connor, lives in Albuquerque. RC is proud of Connor and his two children. Elliot is seven years old an Ms. Anna (Anastasia) is five years old. They call her "Gigi Grandma."

Art and RC met at the Los Volcanos Senior Center. Art was working out with his gym partner, Rudy Simek. Along comes RC. She watched how they were doing their workouts and was impressed. RC asked if she could workout with them. They had a schedule of routines and worked out six days a week. Weights was something she never did before. The threesome has expanded to include Sherrie. "Pumping iron like nobody's business!" The four are known as the "Dream Team."

Art and RC help out at Cross of Hope. RC is the Director Worship and Community Life. She does a variety of different things behind the scenes. Art is a bit more visible – he ushers with Rudy Simek and Ron Cordova. This is the team that greets you with warmth and a smile every Sunday and they make sure there are hymnals and plenty of chairs for all.

Both Art and RC have been a wonderful addition to our congregation. They certainly have brought supplemental help that helps us function.

The final question that should not be left uncovered – What does RC stand for? She didn't tell me. I guess you have to ask her and see if she will share that information.
