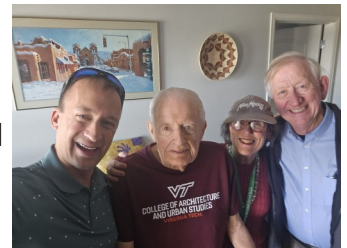

Nurse’s Corner By: Mary Hughes

National Nurse’s Day started in New Mexico. In 1982, Nurse Carol Lewis proposed the idea of establishing a day to recognize nurses across the nation.

With the support of Congressman Manuel Lujan (R-NM), who served in the House of Representatives 1969-1989. The U.S. Congress passed a joint resolution designating May 6 as a National Recognition Day for Nurses. On March 25, 1982. President Ronald Regan signed the proclamation into public law, formally recognizing the vital role nurses play in the health of the nation.

In 1990, the American Nurses Association expanded the recognition into a weeklong celebration concluding on the birthday of nursing pioneer Florence Nightingale.

New Mexico nurses proudly care for patients and families in our state in hospitals, clinics, schools, homes, tribal communities, rural areas, and public health settings. They serve as caregivers, educators, advocates, and leaders – continuing a legacy of service that began generations ago and will guide the future of healthcare in NM. Together, we honor our history, protect our legacy, and build the future of nursing.

Cross of Hope is fortunate to have some wonderful nurses as a part of our community. They have served in many ways; nursing spirituality has been at the heart of nursing theory and research for over 30 years. So remember to thank them for all they have done both in our church, school and community.
